Mother reimbursed for her sacrifice

The JP Bayly Trust has reimbursed a total of \$4,440.00 which was spent by Rovina Devi to put her daughter Aanchal Payal Kumar into the Fiji National University (FNU) to complete her tertiary studies and who graduated with a Certificate in Culinary Arts in 2018. This was done after receiving the relevant official documents from the two institutions.

Ms Devi withdrew \$2,200.00 of her funds from the Fiji National Provident Fund (FNPF) and put another By Joel Sahai

\$2,240.00 of her personal savings to fulfill her daughter's goal to attain a tertiary qualification and make her mother proud. A single mother, Rovina Devi was then and continues to be, the sole breadwinner in a family of three daughters and works at the Fiji Dairy Limited, formerly Rewa Dairy Cooperative, at a very low weekly income.

When the Trust became aware that in addition to her personal savings, her Mother also used

her FNPF money to provide for Aanchal's tertiary education, it was of the strong view that FNPF funds are effectively, for the welfare of the member after retirement and in her old age and decided to reimburse the total funds spent.

The Suva Bayly Welfare and Education Center provided for Aanchal's education up to year thirteen but did not assist with her Tertiary education fees. It however, gave her other needs such as books, stationery, bag and safety boots.

She is currently on a three month attachment at the Tanoa Plaza in Suva, arranged by the Trust which continues to assist her younger sister who has entered the sixth form in 2019.

65 years serving the less fortunate



This year marks 65 years since the JP Bayly Trust was established in 1954 to provide much needed assistance to the less fortunate families in Fiji, by the late John Percy Bayly OBE and the late Rev. Dr. George Hemming CF, OBE.

It operates Medical Clinics, Welfare and Education Centers in Suva, Lautoka and Labasa. The Clinics provide free consultation as well as medication to just over 400 families who are registered with each Center while the Welfare Center gives out monthly food rations and clothes throughout the year.

The Education Center assists their children with Kindergarten, Primary and Secondary schooling needs by way of fees where applicable, uniforms, shoes, bags, stationery and exercise books.

Also, several of their children in Tertiary institutions have their fees and other needs paid for by the Trust.

Mr. Bauleka graduated with a Bachelor of Engineering (Civil) degree from the University of Canterbury in New Zealand and is a member of the Fiji Institution of Engineers and Australian Institute of Engineers.

From 1975 he was Engineering Assistant for a Civil & Structural Engineering company in Wellington, New Zealand for 2 years, following which was site Engineer at the Monasavu Hydro project and Senior Engineer with IMEL, an engineering company in Suva.

A Principal Civil Engineer with the Fiji Electricity Authority and Senior Engineer in a firm of Structural Consulting Engineers in Sydney, Australia in the late 1980s, he later became Port Engineer with Ports Terminal

Limited in Fiji and Director of Engineering with Maritime & Ports Authority of Fiji where as a major assignment, was involved with the rehabilitation of the Suva and the extension of the Lautoka Wharves, both of which were funded by the Asian Development Bank for just over \$50 million.

With the reform of the Fiji Port Industry Mr. Bauleka was appointed General Manager, Infrastructure & Services of Fiji Ports Corporation Limited in 2005 and also acted as its Chief Executive Officer from 2007 to 2011.

In 2012 he moved to Papua New Guinea to join the PNG Ports Corporation as its General Manager Infrastructure and was Chief Infrastructure Officer until 2017.

Mr. Bauleka was also Chairman of the Fiji Sports Council for five years from 1999 and was involved in the planning of the infrastructure and services for the 2003 Games in Suva.
