Making a difference to a rural School

I went to Labasa in mid - December 2020 for the usual internal audit meeting and was met at the Airport by the Manager Northern, Satishwar Chand.

Due to the impact of COVID - 19, a lot of travel had been disrupted within the country and flights to the Northern Division and outer islands in particular, were always in question at the best of times. In addition, issues with the Labasa Airport runway also contributed to unreliable flight schedules.

I was therefore, unable to travel to Labasa for the mid- year audit but was finally there and briefed by the Manager Northern on a slightly different excursion.

We were to be accompanied by the Labasa Welfare Committee Chairman Bhupendra Sharma on a road trip to Nabua Primary School, in an isolated area located some 120 kilometers from Labasa within the district of Koroalau in Cakaudrove, to handover donated stationery packs to the Head Teacher and students.

Blessed with fine weather, our route involved going through the famous 'Hibiscus Highway' bridging Labasa and Savusavu. I have always enjoyed trips to the North, but this would be the first time to travel to an isolated School in Vanua Levu. The roads to Savusavu from Labasa are quite scenic and make for good driving. Savusavu is located on the coast and has a natural beauty to it. I had been forewarned by the Manager Satishwar that the sealed roads to Savusavu would change to rougher terrain once we began the inland road to the School.

This turned out to be quite true once we went off the tar sealed track and I was grateful that the 4 x 4 twin cab vehicle was able to master the rugged terrain as we slowly and bumpily made our approach. By way of a background, the School is located in Nabua village which consists around 200 residents. It is along the coast of Natewa Bay and has students from nearby settlements and neighbouring villages.

With such a rough terrain and isolated area, it is no wonder that 18 of its 70 students are boarders. After travelling an hour on the beaten track, we finally made it to our destination and were heartily greeted by the Head Teacher Mr. Bal Sanju Reddy, the

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School Manager Mr Ponipate Loganimasi and Teachers, Ms. Ana Raramasi and Keresi.

They had prepared a simple but very refreshing lunch consisting of a variety of healthy fruits such as pineapples, bananas, papaws with Bu (coconut water) and fruit juices. After a few words of welcome, the Welfare Committee Chairman Mr. Sharma explained the purpose of our visit to the hosts. The Manager Northern and I also shared a few words of encouragement for the Teachers.

As we advanced to the hall, parents and children were already seated and waiting in eager anticipation. Following an introduction by Mr. Reddy, we proceeded with presenting each child and parent with the stationery packs. It was very moving to see the faces of the young children and parents break into wide smiles as they came to collect their packs. Knowing that we had assisted and saved them some struggles brought a sense of happiness and well-being in our hearts.

Mr. Reddy then gave us a tour of the dorms, ablution area and dining facilities. These were very basic at best and needed extensive renovations to get it to a better standard and Mr. Reddy explained that this was still "work in progress" and they were trying to source funds for an upgrade. The Welfare Chairman Mr. Sharma gave further words of encouragement and mentioned that the School would be assisted where possible by Bayly Labasa.

This concluded our tour of the School and we were soon bidding farewells to our hosts. As we headed back, I could not help but feel sympathy for the hard struggle of the parents and students of an isolated village School. I however, was very glad that we were able to assist them in some way and proud to make a difference because of JP Bayly Trust.

For me, this trip was certainly well worth it and my appreciation goes out to the Bayly Labasa team for their initiative.

Quality Health Care and Social Services

Medical Services Pacific (MSP), a NGO providing Pacific women, youth and children with access to quality health care and social services, made a presentation at a Bayly Trust Workshop in Suva which was attended by all three Committee Chairpersons from Labasa, Lautoka and Suva, Divisional Manages, the General Manager and Trustees.

Ms. Jacintha Mama'o elaborated on the services they provided while Ms. Sereima Seinibici gave an explanation on how they carried out the different types of counselling at their various centers. The Divisional Managers engaged with the MSP ladies with quality discussions on how MSP and the Bayly Trust could assist each other with the services offered. MSP left information booklets and posters which included the following:-

Health Focus

The MSP program seeks to provide a comprehensive range of health and social services for women and youth. With a focus on strengthening sexual reproductive health care services and family planning and increasing options in service delivery.

Youth Focus

MSP provides youth - friendly services and seeks to address key youth issues in SRH, such as:-

- 1. Teenage pregnancies
- 2. Unmet need for contraception in young people
- 3. STI, HIV/AIDs and Reproductive Tract Infections (RTI)
- 4. Sexual violence.

MSP is promoting healthy behaviours through the MSP "healthy choices" community awareness and outreach programs.

Gender Focus

MSP is committed to rights based and voluntary family planning and works to ensure Pacific women and adolescents have access to quality and professional health services, particularly reproductive health and maternal and child health services. MSP works to raise the status of women and seeks to end Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) and provides clinical services to respond to sexual assaults.

Somehow our Dad came to know about the Bayly Welfare Center and approached its office in Lautoka where an interview and a home visitation were done which was

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their normal procedure. Mrs. Sarojani Michael, the Western Manager came to visit us and was very emotional when she saw my Grandma taking care of a family of six which included three sickly adults in the house with a son and two daughters.

After a month my Dad went to the Bayly Welfare Center again where he was told that he will be assisted by the Center with food and all our schooling needs. That afternoon when he came home we could see the glimpse of happiness in his eyes and he couldn't stop crying, telling my Grandma not to worry as we will be fine for my brother and I will be fully supported by the Bayly Trust.

The same evening he made my brother and myself sit next to him and told us that we both have to work really hard with our education. He was a staunch Muslim and wanted us to follow our Muslim religion as he did.

On the 30th day of his prayers one of my Aunties who was sick passed away as well and we thought this was not fair for our Grandma as losing two of her adult children was not easy to handle at her age of 67 years.

Her words of encouragement got me back on track of feeling that life was beautiful and just waiting for me to enjoy in a blissful manner. Without her I would have given up ages back but with her strength and support towards my family and myself we just kept moving in the right direction.

My *Dadi* Salimun Nisha, my brother and I are proud to be a member the Bayly family and this will surely be treasured by mine. After our own, the second family is none other than the JP Bayly Trust and the Lautoka Bayly Welfare team. Thank you all so much for being there for us at the time of need.

Centers pursue additional activities

A part from its core function of providing Medical, Dental, Welfare and Educational assistance to its registered cases which continues to be ongoing, all Centers have embarked on Workshops which included counselling and awareness provided to our cases by external resource persons and organisations.

These have been presented by the Juvenile Unit of the Fiji Police, Empower Pacific as well as Medical Counsellors and the Fiji Women's Crisis Center on a variety of subjects which were considered prevalent, topical as well as relevant in order to create a better understanding as well as a greater awareness to the participants.

Sexual Assault, Child Abuse, Rape, Domestic Violence, Harassment against Women & Children, Health & Wellness, Mental Health and Preventing Suicides, Child Protection & Drug Abuse and Positive Parenting have been such subjects.

So far a total of nine Workshops have been held and included one on Food Skills & Making Value Added Food Products such that participants not only gain a knowledge on the skills but utilize their learnings and engage in an activity which would bring financial gains to the family.

Additionally, all Centers have encouraged its cases to get involved in backyard gardening not only to improve their family's food consumption with better nutrients but also to save money in having to buy vegetables. This was promoted vigorously and implemented following an assessment by the National Food & Nutrition Centre of our food packs in early 2019.
